As we pass the midpoint of 2026, I am pleased to provide a brief update on the activities of the Deer Park-Silverton Joint Fire District during the first half of the year. This report highlights the types of emergencies to which our personnel have responded, along with several operational updates and accomplishments.

Emergency medical incidents continue to account for most of our responses, representing over 75 percent of all calls for service. In addition to emergency medical calls, our personnel have responded to structure fires, vehicle accidents, fire alarms, public service requests, and other emergencies throughout the communities we serve. We remain committed to providing timely, professional service to our residents while also supporting our neighboring fire departments through automatic aid when needed.

The first week of July marked an important milestone with our newest ambulance being placed into service. This vehicle replaces an aging unit and will help ensure we continue providing reliable emergency medical transportation for years to come. We are also in the final stages of launching our new Fire District website. The updated site will provide residents with easier access to information about our services, safety education, and Fire District news. Staff training on the new platform will begin soon so we can keep the information current and continue improving communication with our community.

While emergency response remains our primary mission, our personnel continue to stay engaged in the community through public education programs, station tours, community events, fire inspections, and other outreach efforts. These opportunities strengthen the relationships we have with the residents and businesses we serve.

Finally, I would like to thank the exceptional employees of the Deer Park-Silverton Joint Fire District for their continued dedication to our residents and guests. Their professionalism, commitment, and willingness to serve are the reasons we can provide high-quality fire and emergency medical services every day. I appreciate everything they do, and I am proud of the way they represent the Fire District and our communities.

January 2026 — Working with the local chapter of Sleep in Heavenly Peace, fire district staff assisted in assembling beds for a family in need in our community.



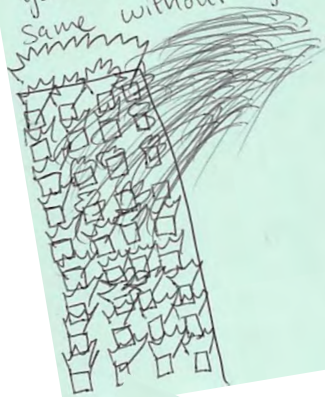
Spring 2026 — Various photos of the new medic unit during its production. This unit went into service in early July.

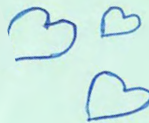

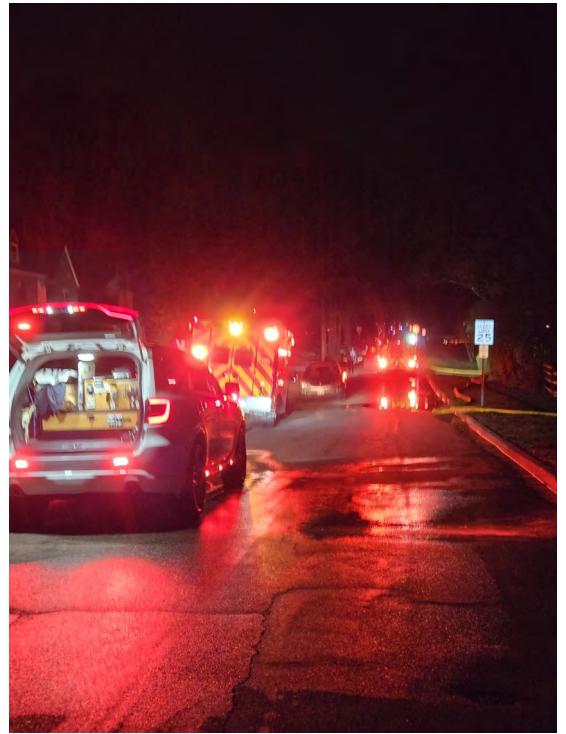

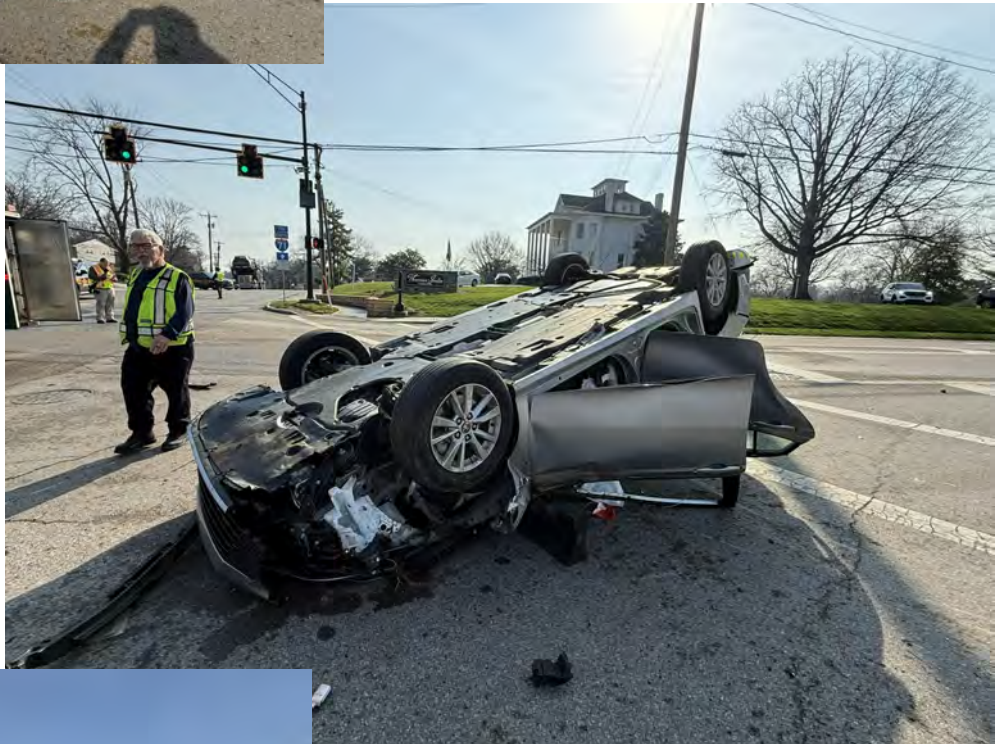
